Traditionally considered to have been authored in the 11<sup>th</sup> century, it has been recited as part of the priest's breviary almost continuously since then. # O Come, O Come Emmanuel

Today is the first day of Advent. Christmas is less than four weeks away. Already, we are surrounded by decorations, lights, and music that would make us think we are in the full swing of celebrating this religious feast. For many in our culture, Christmas is nothing more than a secular event — a chance to decorate, party, and exchange gifts. For most, it is no different from the exaggerated emphasis placed on Halloween (another religious feast coopted by the culture) or the celebration of July 4 for our American friends. For most people, the religious aspect of Christmas has faded into the background, if it has not even disappeared for them. For us, as Catholics, practising Catholics —not just those in name — Advent needs to be different. But how?

- Advent, like Lent before Easter, is a season of preparation, even penitential in nature. The
  purple vestments and decorations in the church reflect that this is a season of sobriety and
  penance as our focus concentrates on the fact that Jesus will come again in history to
  judge all of us, just as He came once before, as a baby, to tell us of God's plan for
  forgiveness and redemption.
- 2. Perhaps we can hold off on decorating our houses and listening to Christmas music until much closer to December 25. Christmas BEGINS on December 25; it doesn't end on that day. Maybe we could have a nativity scene take prominence in our houses until we place our trees up closer to the day. Do you have an Advent wreath on your table that you light before your meal together? It doesn't have to be fancy, even just four candles of any colour lined up in dollar store holders would suffice as a reminder of the season.
- 3. Have you begun to prepare for a good confession before Christmas? Not just the usual repetition of the laundry list of sins, but a real examination of your faults, your deliberate sins. How have you advanced in rooting out just one sin from your life since last Christmas?
- 4. People often confess something like: "I put other things before God in my life." What does that mean? Concretely? Exactly how do you put Christ second? Well, one of the ways that we do that is by throwing ourselves headlong into Christmas, just like the secular culture around us. If we are serious about confessing that sin, then why not try to do something concrete about it? If you don't have an advent wreath, get four candles and make a point of lighting them. Why not delay putting your tree up even by a week? Why not turn off the Christmas radio station at least until the middle of the month? Why not just do something to remind yourself that we are in Advent, that we are PREPARING for Christmas, and that we are not celebrating it yet?
- 5. Have you thought of the poor? Our gift tree is an excellent way to brighten a child's Christmas by donating a gift to one of the many who come to us at Christmas seeking help.
- 6. Can you give one hour of your time to sit before the Lord in adoration, even just sitting there before Him, if nothing other than to take a deep breath and put the frenetic activity aside for an hour? Allow Him to calm your mind and soul? To pray slowly and with sincerity, repeating over and over: "Lord, I believe; Lord, I love You; Lord, come into my heart." Come on December 7 to the holy hour for peace.
